"I'm excited to be able to utilize the knowledge gained from those experiences to serve as a key opinion leader and subject matter expert at Florence Healthcare. Esiason is a cystic fibrosis and rare disease patient leader who is passionate about early-stage drug development, patient empowerment and health policy. Professionally, he developed a patient engagement platform for a medical nutrition company and built a venture philanthropy practice at the Boomer Esiason Foundation. He has consulted on clinical trial development, a real-world evidence population health study, and a cystic fibrosis-specific mental health and wellness screening tool.

Esiason has been the face of fundraising efforts for the Boomer Esiason Foundation, which has yielded more than \$160 million for the fight against cystic fibrosis since he was diagnosed with the condition in 1993. His blog has amassed nearly one million page views since 2015 and he co-hosted the podcast, *Breathe In: A Cystic Fibrosis Podcast*, which climbed into the iTunes top 200 health podcasts at the end of 2018. He has recently hosted the podcast, *The State of Health with Gunnar Esiason*, which is available on all streaming services and featured several sitting U.S. senators, governors and health industry leaders. His health *Wall Street Journal, USA Today, The Hill* and *STAT News*.

"I have spent more than half a decade inside several clinical trial programs as a participant, and while I have been fortunate to see what success looks like firsthand, I have also seen how inefficient trials can be," said Esiason. "The clinical trials of tomorrow need to meet participants where they are in their lives, and I'm thrilled that Florence Healthcare is committed to making that happen."
